**09:25-10:05**      **From Rehabilitation to Real Life: Rethinking Success After Brain Injury**

**Speaker TBC, Consultant in Rehabilitation Medicine**

This session critically examines how “successful community integration” is currently defined and evaluated within rehabilitation pathways, moving beyond discharge milestones and impairment-based outcomes. It will explore the assumptions embedded within prevailing rehabilitation models that shape how long-term participation, identity and independence are understood.

Delegates will consider the distinction between clinical rehabilitation gains and sustainable community outcomes, recognising why progress achieved in structured environments does not always transfer into everyday life. The session introduces a shared conceptual framework for viewing community integration as an important outcome in its own right, rather than simply a by-product of rehabilitation input. Providing a system-wide perspective, the discussion will establish a common analytical reference point for the biological, clinical, managerial and medico-legal themes explored throughout the wider conference programme.

**10:05-10:40**      **Beyond Injury Severity: The Biology of Stress, Fatigue and Recovery**

**Dr Mike Dilley, Consultant Neuropsychiatrist in Neurorehabilitation, Brain & Mind**

This neuropsychiatry-focused session explores why recovery and reintegration following brain injury are often non-linear, fragile and subject to fluctuation, even where rehabilitation has been effective. It examines the biological and physiological mechanisms that can influence longer-term outcomes, including disrupted stress systems, sleep disturbance, fatigue and inflammatory load.

The session will consider brain injury as an ongoing physiological stress condition affecting both survivors and their families, and how these factors interact with cognition, mood, behaviour and recovery trajectories. It will also explore why progress may plateau or vary over time despite positive rehabilitation input, alongside the influence of environment and family context in supporting or hindering recovery. Practical relevance will be highlighted throughout, with application to clinical reasoning, longer-term rehabilitation planning and medico-legal contexts. Content TBC.

**11:10-11:45**

**Beyond the 'good day': understanding fragile recovery after brain injury**

**Dr Benjamin Marram, Neuropsychologist, Clarity Psychology**

This session explores how psychological factors such as mood, anxiety, trauma and stress interact with cognitive challenges including fatigue, reduced insight and fluctuating capacity to shape recovery after brain injury. It highlights how these issues combine to influence behaviour, expectations and community reintegration, and why “good days” can be misleading when planning support. The session also considers the wider context in which recovery takes place, recognising the impact of family dynamics, social circumstances, health services, ageing and external pressures. It will explore the lived experience for families, including increasing stress, shifting roles and loss of identity, alongside themes such as participation without purpose and the importance of belonging. Drawing on neuropsychological thinking, the session will focus on recognising early signs of fragility, improving communication across clinical, commissioning and medico-legal contexts, and supporting earlier, more effective intervention.

**“Client-Centred” — Or Just Conflict-Avoidant? When Decision Making Becomes Complex**

**Natalie Mackenzie, Director & Cognitive Rehabilitation Therapist, BIS Services**

Client-centred practice is one of the most important principles in brain injury rehabilitation. When insight is impaired, capacity fluctuates, and the pressures around a client pull in competing directions, what does genuinely client-centred practice actually look like in practice?

Drawing on real-world experience of cognitive rehabilitation in community settings, this session explores the tensions that arise most frequently during community reintegration: fluctuating capacity and its impact on informed decision-making; the collision between a client’s goals and functional reality; and the legal obligations that exist independently of what any team member, or client, would prefer.

Revealing the gap between what clients say they will do and what they do in practice, and how observed evidence over time is the only reliable basis for complex decisions. Delegates will see what this looks like in real community moments, the practical tools and reasoning that we need to call upon to use when decisions are genuinely hard.

Delegates will leave with a clearer understanding of the tensions between autonomy and protection, aspiration and realism, and independence and long-term sustainability, and what clinically grounded, ethically sound and legally defensible decisions look like when those tensions cannot be resolved neatly.

## **Connected Recovery: How Technology Helps — and Hinders — Brain Injury Rehab at Home**

**Sarah Daniel, Director & Consultant Neurological Physiotherapist, MotionRehab & Jennifer Benson - Founder and Independent Speech and Language Therapist, Jennifer Benson Speech and Language Therapy Ltd**

This presentation explores the role of technology in supporting rehabilitation at home following brain injury, highlighting both its advantages and its limitations. It will examine how various technological solutions can enhance access to therapy, promote independence, and enable more consistent practice outside of clinical settings. At the same time, the presentation will consider key challenges, including issues with motivation and engagement, accessibility barriers, and the risk of over-reliance on technology. By considering both the benefits and potential drawbacks, the session aims to provide a balanced perspective on how technology can be effectively and safely integrated into home-based rehabilitation programmes.

## **Living Within the System: Inequality, Access and Community Life After Brain Injury**

**Dr Caroline J. Bald, Lecturer in Social Work, The Open University, Chair of the Brain Injury Social Work Group**

In this session, Dr Caroline Bald will consider inequality - who is able to access that support - and what happens when they can't? Focusing on the realities of statutory systems, this session explores how access to support is shaped by NHS pathways, local authority thresholds, interprofessional blocks and wider social inequalities. It highlights how people and families navigate fragmented provision, limited resources, and inconsistent decision-making - and how these conditions directly influence whether community reintegration is sustained or begins to break down. Drawing on practice, research and lived experience, the session will identify the early, often overlooked indicators that support is becoming unsustainable, and consider what this means for professionals working across health, social care and legal contexts.

## **Spinning Plates in the Dark: Decision Making and Effective Practice in Community Reintegration - what ingredients help?**

**Dr Mark Holloway, Senior Brain Injury Case Manager & Expert Witness, Head First**

In this session, Dr Mark Holloway will recognise early indicators that facilitate successful community reintegration and those that may more likely lead to breakdown during community reintegration after brain injury, by identifying bio-psycho-social, administrative, legal, and financial challenges that impact upon potential success. Utilising real-world longitudinal examples, his presentation will illustrate different long and short-term approaches required to address complexity. He will also reflect upon decades of experience of working with some individuals, and the varying challenges that present across a lifespan, to identify what does it look like when it works, and what to do if it does not.

**Planning for the Case You'll Defend in the Future: Proving Need When Outcomes Are Human**

**Ian Brownhill, Barrister, 39 Essex Chambers**

This session explores how rehabilitation, care and support decisions are scrutinised within different legal frameworks, touching on personal injury claims, Court of Protection decision making and safeguarding frameworks. It will examine how evidence is assessed when outcomes relate not only to clinical change, but also to participation, long-term sustainability, risk reduction, caregiver burden, non-linear progress and quality of life.

Delegates will consider how principles of reasonableness and proportionality can be applied to the planning and justification of longer-term, participation-based support. The discussion will also address how short-term funding decisions and false economies may contribute to repeated breakdowns, escalating needs and increased long-term risk.

Practical focus will be given to how clinical and case management decisions are interpreted within legal processes, including areas of challenge or vulnerability. Attendees will gain insight into articulating, evidencing and documenting long-term need in a way that is coherent across clinical, commissioning and legal settings.

**Panel Discussion: What We Missed, What Worked, What Changed: Community Integration Through Multiple Lenses**

**The presenters, Ian Carrier, Partner, RWK Goodman, Mark & Jules Kennedy, Family Members and Client**

A multidisciplinary panel exploring one brain injury journey through different perspectives, highlighting where reintegration succeeds, struggles, or nearly fails.

The discussion focuses on critical decision points rather than personal narratives: where assumptions were made, early warning signs overlooked, or system responses unintentionally increased risk. Panel members reflect on how clinical judgement, therapy input, case management decisions and legal frameworks interacted in real time, (often under pressure and with incomplete information) and how alternative decisions might have altered outcomes.

Particular attention is given to tensions between autonomy and safety, optimism and realism, short-term solutions and long-term sustainability. By hearing directly from families and a brain injury survivor alongside those responsible for planning, funding and delivering care, delegates gain an integrated understanding of how professional decisions land in everyday life and how experienced practitioners can better anticipate consequences, align perspectives and prevent avoidable breakdowns.

He provides input across the entire integrated care pathway for patients with neuropsychiatric needs associated with brain injury at King's. As such, Mike will often support a person's recovery along their entire journey from acute care to a return to the community.

He is a member of the Clinical Reference Group in Rehabilitation, Disability & Spinal Cord Injury at NHS England and immediate past Chair of the Faculty of Neuropsychiatry, Royal College of Psychiatrists. Mike is also a Trustee of the United Kingdom Brain Injury Forum (UKABIF) and of The Neurological Alliance. He is currently Co-Clinical Director of the King's Health Partner's Academic Health Sciences Centre, Mind & Body Programme focussed on the integration of physical and mental health.

His previous roles have included leading the inpatient mental health services in Westminster, the national neuropsychiatry unit at The Maudsley, on the brain injury unit at St George's Hospital, the rehabilitation units at Putney and Blackheath and as Clinical Director of the NHSE London Neurosciences Network.

Mike has worked extensively across organisational networks both locally, regionally and nationally in integrating mental health services for people with neurological conditions as well as in teaching and training about neurobehavioural rehabilitation and neuropsychiatric treatment. Mike completed his training at King's College London, The Maudsley, National Hospital for Neurology & Neurosurgery, Institute of Psychiatry and The University of Birmingham. He is a co-investigator in the NIHR funded randomised trial of primary prevention of depression after traumatic brain injury.

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## **Dr Ben Marram**

Dr Ben Marram is a Consultant Clinical Neuropsychologist and Chartered Occupational Psychologist with specialist expertise in acquired brain injury, neurological conditions, and psychological rehabilitation.

He is an associate of Clarity Psychology, a team providing neuropsychological therapy, consultation, and rehabilitation services across the UK.

With a career spanning NHS, independent, and medico-legal contexts, Dr Marram has extensive experience supporting individuals and families affected by traumatic brain injury, stroke, and progressive neurological disorders.

His clinical approach integrates evidence-based neuropsychological assessment with tailored therapeutic interventions, drawing on cognitive behavioural, systemic, and third-wave psychological models. Natalie is also known as The Brain Injury Therapist, a global platform providing online education, one-to-one cognitive rehabilitation programs, and group memberships for individuals unable to access statutory services due to location or funding barriers. She is the author of the Fatigue Management Journal, a six-month education and tracking resource for managing brain injury fatigue, and regularly delivers training to professionals, workplaces, and educational institutions on brain injury and ADHD and fatigue management.

In addition to her clinical expertise, Natalie is the Chair of the International Society for Cognitive Rehabilitation, where she works to advance global standards and practices in the field. In 2018, Sarah realised an ambition by opening the UK's first Intensive Robotic-Led Neurological Rehabilitation Facility in Leeds, integrating robotics and virtual reality into therapy. Her mission was bold yet simple: to accelerate recovery, helping individuals regain mobility, independence, and confidence faster than traditional approaches allowed. This innovation earned international recognition, including a prestigious digital innovation award from Google and the Financial Times.

Building on this success, Sarah has expanded MOTIONrehab creating a network of cutting-edge facilities that continue to redefine neurological rehabilitation in the UK. Her approach—combining advanced technology with high-intensity, evidence-based therapy—has challenged conventional models of care and delivered life-changing outcomes for patients from across the globe.

She has specialist expertise in augmentative and alternative communication (AAC), communication technology, and voice banking, supporting individuals to maintain identity, autonomy, and participation following neurological injury or illness. She leads a team delivering person-centred intervention across community rehabilitation settings, and works closely with multidisciplinary teams to ensure communication is effectively integrated into wider rehabilitation planning. Jennifer is actively involved in complex case management and acts as a treating therapist

Dr Caroline J. Bald is a social work academic at The Open University with a professional background in probation and youth justice. Her work sits at the intersection of social work, criminal justice, and health, with a particular focus on acquired brain injury (ABI) and its implications for education, practice, and systems design. Caroline is Chair of the Brain Injury Social Work Group (BISWG) and a Director of the British Association of Social Workers (BASW), where she leads the Criminal Justice Special Interest Group. From her role as research fellow on the NIHR Heads Together project, she works to strengthen the visibility of social work and social care within interdisciplinary brain injury contexts and to promote more integrated responses across statutory, health, and third sector systems.



**Dr Mark Holloway**

Dr Mark Holloway is a social work qualified independent brain injury case manager and expert witness and has worked with individuals and families affected by acquired brain injury since 1991. He has been a Case Manager for Head First since 2001, working across the UK and further afield. Mark is Advanced Member of British Association of Brain Injury Case Managers (BABICM), a Trustee of the Brain Injury Social Work Group, and an Executive Committee member of the International Network of Social Work Acquired Brain Injury. He is a researcher on the Heads Together project and has published academic articles and book chapters relating to brain injury and co-authored a book on the family experience of brain injury. Mark has contributed to the writing of NICE Guidelines in relation to Supported Decision Making and Rehabilitation following Brain Injury. Mark has experience in providing evidence in civil, criminal and criminal injury compensation cases, has provided evidence to the Court of Protection and written evidence for the House of Commons Select Committee on Health third report on Head Injury and to the House of Lords Select Committee review of the Mental Capacity Act. He has acted as Single Joint Social Work Expert in cases for the Family Courts and the Court of Protection and acted as an expert witness in the Family and Coroner's Courts.
